## Hungarian Premier Janos Kadar Resigns

BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP)—Janos Kadar, veteran Hungarian leader, resigned Monday as premier but kept his job as chief of the Communist Party.

The government and party reshuffle apparently follows the new Soviet pattern of collective leadership by separating top government and party functions.

Kadar, 53, was succeeded as premier by his long-time deputy, Gyula Kallai, 55, known as the chief ideologist of the Hungarian Communist Party.

An announcement by the central committee said Kadar was relieved of his duties as chairman of the council of ministers in order to be able to devote his whole time to his duties as the first secretary of the central committee.

Official sources said the reshuffle, affecting seven government and party leaders, did not mean any changes in Hungary's domestic and foreign policies but was designed to take "some burden off Mr. Kadar's shoulders."

This was interpreted as an indication that Kadar, who held the post of premier since the Soviet crushing of the 1956 Hungarian revolution, was in full agreement with the central committee.

Earlier this month Kadar granted a rare interview to Associated Press writer Preston Overby. The premier then seemed calm and assured about his future and the future of Hungary.

He said in the interview that he was "ready at any time to go any place" to improve relations with the United States and to promote general understanding and peaceful coexistence.

Kadar's resignation and the reshuffle of the cabinet were announced three days after a special session of the central committee of the Hungarian Socialist Workers' (Communist) Party. The announcement was published by the official news agency MTI.

Of peasant origin, Kadar entered the liberal Communist party and became its leader at age 19. In World War II while some of the country's top Communists went to Moscow, he stayed at home and became a tough underground leader.

Kadar was imprisoned by the postwar Communist regime of Matyas Rakosi, but within three years he had pushed Rakosi into exile and replaced him as head of the government.

After the 1956 revolt was put down by Soviet troops, Kadar was installed as premier. He remained as party chief, but was back again as premier in 1961, replacing aging Ferenc Murnich.

Kallai, the new premier, is a lifelong friend of Kadar. Kallai served as foreign minister from 1949 to 1961, as minister of culture and education from 1947 to 1960 and as first deputy premier beginning in 1960.

Authoritative sources in Budapest said Kadar's resignation as premier had been under consideration since late 1964.

Kadar was said to have postponed a decision, however, after the ouster of Nikita Khrushchev as premier had been under consideration since late 1964.

## The Urges GOP Avoid Circus-Type Conventions

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower urged Republicans Monday to reform their presidential nominating convention along militant lines to avoid the quadrennial confusion he said has horrified most Americans.
